

Beaverhill Bird Observatory Update November 1 to 12, 2008

Well, the field season is over for the Beaverhill Bird Observatory. The lab has been shut down and Saw-whet Owl migration monitoring is completed. We had a pretty slow final 11 days for owls, with only 4 captured in 8 nights of netting. We were shut down early on two nights due to wind and one night due to the first snowfall of the season. Our final night of netting, the nets were actually frozen shut, so it took a while to thaw them out. We thought about trying a few more nights, but with the forecast for freezing rain on the 12th and high winds on the 13th we decided that something was telling us to quit. We had no owls on the final four nights of netting indicating we are at the end. So the final count was only 131 Saw-whet Owls, our lowest number of owls ever captured, but not our lowest capture rate.
