

## Beaverhill Bird Observatory Update, May 21- May 28, 2018

This week at the banding lab has been quite eventful! We started the week off with our Birdathon which included a team of 8 people and it was a blast! We started the Birdathon with banding and then after lunch, we proceeded to the Llama pond and we were able to see many shorebirds. Following our visit to the Llama pond, we headed to Elk Island National Park to continue birding with the highlight sighting being a Cooper's hawk. From our Birdathon, we got a total of 121 species. It was a fantastic day of birding on Victoria Day.

This past week we added eight new species to our list which included: Common

Yellowthroat, Warbling Vireo, Gadwall (the duck just flew right into the net), Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Yellow-bellied Flycatcher and Magnolia Warbler. The huge highlight of the week was catching a Canada Warbler. Normally, we do not catch very many of this species, so it was nice to be able to band one during spring migration. We also had some of our busiest days this past week with a max of 38 birds banded.
