## Beaverhill Bird Observatory

Weekly Update October 5 – 11, 2023

Things were quite slow during songbird banding out at the BBO this week. We've reached the tail end of songbird migration, with the majority of birds captured this week being non-migratory species that are resident in the area year round. There were a few stragglers still migrating through, most notably a surprisingly late Wilson's Warbler still making its way south. Get a move on little buddy! Despite the low capture volume we did hit an exciting milestone this week: we caught our 3000<sup>th</sup> bird of fall migration! The Song Sparrow in question was no doubt delighted to be the honourable recipient of this title.

Out on Beaverhill Lake, large numbers of Snow Geese continue to congregate and make a racket all throughout the night. From a distance, entire areas of the lake can appear white due to the massive number of geese! Flocks of Tundra Swans are a regular sighting, while a few shorebirds are still hanging around the open water.

While things have been slow on songbird migration, owl migration has been pushing through in full force. On our busiest night we caught 17 Northern Saw-whet Owls as well as a Long-eared Owl! Motus tags have been strategically deployed throughout the week, with the aim of getting nanotags on varying ages of bird. We caught 2 foreign Saw-whet Owls this week as well, which are another exciting piece of the puzzle for learning about the migration of these birds. One was originally banded near Bragg Creek, Alberta; while the other was banded near Prince Albert, Saskatchewan!
