Fencing Project Being Completed

As part of our Shoreline Improvement Program, the Beaverhill Bird Observatory has received funding to improve fencing around the Natural Area. We have contracted a local farmer to complete the north fence to enclose the Natural Area. This will ensure that there is no access by cattle to the shoreline around the Natural Area, which can damage the wetlands and reduces water quality. We thank Shell Environment Fund and Mountain Equipment Coop for funding this program.



Beaverhill Bird Observatory Golondrinas de las Americas Project Update

The Beaverhill Bird Observatory has partnered with a new International program. Golondrinas de las Americas is a community of biologists dedicated to studying Tree Swallows and their tropical nearest relatives from Alaska to Argentina, combining detailed studies of the breeding biology of the birds with standardized sampling of the swallows' aerial insect prey. The BBO added 50 Tree Swallow nest boxes to their grid of 50 boxes, and a biologist Shern Kier came to stay lab in June and July to collect data for the program.
