## Beaverhill Bird Observatory Weekly Update August 8th- 14th, 2015

It's been another great week of fall migration here at the BBO! We've managed to surpass over 300 birds caught in only two weeks and 30 different species, including a range of really cool warblers such as a Mourning Warbler and a Canada Warbler. We were also hit by a wave of Tennessee Warblers last week that had us feeling about them the same way we feel about our Least Flycatchers (ie. "Great birds, but can we please get something else too?!"); however, the flux of Tenessee Warblers tapered off as this week progressed, making us miss our little TEWAs.

Although we are the Beaverhill **Bird** Observatory, there are plenty of other non-bird related goings-on around the natural area. The dragonfly population has seemingly exploded (hopefully helping to control the pesky mosquito problem), and the fact that they occasionally find themselves stuck in our nets, has given us a great chance to get an up-close look as we extract them. The BBO's thriving insect population also attracted a group of moth-enthusiasts who popped by for a nocturnal survey. They came out fully loaded with lights and tarps and I hear they had a great time (unfortunately, moth surveys take place way past a bird bander's bedtime).
