Weekly Update May 29 – June 4, 2025

This week was our annual Big Birding Breakfast event! We hosted 102 visitors over the course of 2 days, and our guests were treated to a delightful crepe breakfast alongside some busy and exciting bird banding. Many boreal migrants were observed this week including a pair of Magnolia Warblers, a handful of Mourning Warblers, and another Gray-cheeked Thrush. In addition to birds and breakfast, we took our visitors to the grassland to toss feathers for the Tree Swallows. Tree Swallows line their nests with feathers, so in addition to keeping our guests entertained we helped the birds put the finishing touches on their nests! Thank you to everyone who came out!

After the exciting weekend, banding remained steady while staff turned their focus to other projects. Willow continued to hear lots of Yellow and Virginia Rails during her surveys of the marshes around Lister Lake, Jon saw a pair of Red Knots while surveying the shorelines of Beaverhill Lake, and Emelie documented the beginnings of the Least Flycatcher nesting season in the aspen forest. Staff also began setting of for MAPS, which begins in just 1 short week. How is spring migration almost over already?!
