Weekly Update September 26 - October 2, 2025

Amongst the dipping autumn temperatures, spirits soared very high at the Beaverhill Bird Observatory this week! *Supper and Saw-whets*, the annual large owl banding event, took place on September 26th and 27th and hosted 86 joyous participants. Guests were served a warm, home-cooked meal and were entertained with a face-painting station, an Albertan owl trivia game, and a crafting table! Education owls Tansi and Nina took turns captivating the crowds and, of course, the highlight of the evenings was watching the extraction and banding of Northern Saw-whet Owls! Eleven Saw-whet Owls were caught on the 26th and one was caught on the 27th, making for two lovely, informative nights!

Songbird numbers dwindled this week, only yielding 88 captures (Table 1). The most abundant species was still the Myrtle Warbler with 46 captures. Somewhat surprisingly, a very late Northern House Wren was caught on September 28th! On the flip side, Northern Saw-whet Owl captures from this week have accounted for just under half of the total captures for the season (22/46) (Table 2)! This is still considerably lower than expected for this time of year, so hopefully more owls show up in the coming weeks.

Other happenings around the BBO include the outhouse getting pumped, wrapping up project reports, nights of thick fog and aurora performances, and the frequent observation of a bull moose, nicknamed "Marv", around the lab and net lanes! The 27th was also the last day volunteer Linda Aldridge spent at the BBO after nearly a week. Her warmth and extraordinary dedication will be missed, and we all hope she visits again soon!

Supper and Saw-whets would have been truly impossible without the generous help from numerous staff and volunteers.
